

Why understanding anthropology matters


My understanding of the human person informs mission and how I approach and respond to others and myself.

Forming the Whole Child

Children Learn

- > Through the intellect
- Through the senses
- Through experiences

As educators, we need to **acknowledge**, **hear**, and **honor** their experiences – experiences which may be different from our own – experiences that shape how they view the world, how they respond, and how the receive information

Forming the Whole Person

"We look at *all* of the needs of a student, needs that may include emotional, social, spiritual, familial, mental health, physical health, academic, socioeconomic and more. Once the overall needs are identified, a comprehensive plan is put in place which can include the use of faculty, staff, home-school liaisons, tutors, social workers, spiritual directors, and more."
